Things have changed slightly from the early days though – for instance, the then President, Miss Clements, used to give a speech at the end of every concert (don't worry Ruth, there are no plans to revive that custom!) and of course the National Anthem was always played, as it was in cinemas and theatres at the time, which many of us will remember. And there were the odd 'incidents' too, like the person pulling the curtain falling asleep on the job, the leg of a bench folding unexpectedly, sending the men sliding decorously off the stage mid concert, and the rabbit who used to attend rehearsals with its owner! One custom that perhaps we could consider reinstating was the presentation at the end of the concert of a jar of Tiptree

jam to each of the soloists, a tasty treat to finish with, though perhaps it should be honey to soothe exercised voices!

Some of our members have sung with Tiptree Choral for a good number of years (I have discovered a programme from 1985 with Norman's name listed as a soloist – clearly just a youngster at the time!); it would be lovely to collect a few memories from the earlier days of the choir so if you have any stories please send them in!
